### GUEST SPEAKER: Rev Leonie White

**Marie Wood** introduced Leonie, the co-ordinator of Pastoral Care for the past 14 years at the Wagga Wagga Rural Referral Hospital.

Leonie has a multiplicity of roles: in addition to managing the team of 43 volunteers at the WWRRH, she is also the Anglican deacon at St John's, Anglican Chaplain to Calvary Hospital, and a worship leader at Ladysmith.



Leonie (*left*) began by saying pastoral volunteers meet people “where they are at”, to provide emotional and spiritual support if invited to do so.

Leonie told the story of being extremely busy one Sunday, leading two services, taking communion to patients at two hospitals and planning a Christmas service, and being under the continual stress to keep moving. She happened to see a couple with their new baby in the coffee

shop and followed the instinct to stop to talk with them. This pause led to sharing of stories, a sense of peace, “like a warm velvet rug, as if time had stopped,” and of being on sacred ground.
