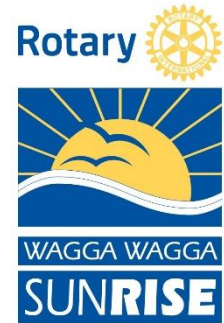

### Meeting No 40 – 17 April, 2018

**TODAY'S PROGRAM: RONALD McDONALD HOUSE WAGGA WAGGA**  
**Speaker: Deborah Braines, Executive Officer**

When introducing her, **Marilyn Walter** told us that Deborah began working at Creaghe Lisle the day before Charles Houen. For 34 years, Deborah worked in television production and administration at RVN 2 now Prime before starting with Ronald McDonald House 15 months before it opened.



**Background** In 2001, Pottsy and Leighton, together with Yvonne Braid, manager of 2WG/Star FM, visited the Children's Ward to find the parents' room at the time was two single beds divided by a curtain. The Kids' Kottage Appeal eventually raised \$350,000 from within Wagga and across the region. The monies were handled by the Sunrise Rotary, thus beginning the club's long association with the House.

**The House** together with Tamworth's, Wagga Wagga is the smallest Ronald McDonald House in the world and one of fourteen houses nationwide. It services families from Wagga Wagga, the Riverina and South West Slopes.

Over 100 years old, the original house at 300 Edward Street was purchased, refurbished, extended and opened on 19 March 2005. Currently, the house has 4 bedrooms, a volunteers' room, family and lounge rooms, kitchen and two offices.

The house next door was purchased for future expansion which is now underway. A breezeway will link the new extension which will have a playroom, office and meeting spaces and accommodation. An area to entertain undercover is also included. In the short term, the two accommodation rooms will be rented to medical staff providing ongoing income.

The House is licensed by Ronald McDonald House Charities in America.

**Volunteers** Referrals to the house are an unknown factor and occur at all hours but commonly families arrive in the early hours of the morning.

About 140 volunteers keep the House operational. A volunteer sleeps in the House every night of the year. Other volunteers look after the housekeeping and outside areas and assist with ongoing fundraising.



Since the house opened, **Bob** and **Carol Martin** have been rostered every second Monday to sleep over while Alan Sharp is 'Spider Man', a dab hand with a cobwebbing broom, keeping the fire sprinklers free of traces crawling critters. **Joan Skews** and **Sandra Rootes** are ticket sellers extraordinaire when needed.

Two positions on the board of twelve directors of Ronald McDonald House are filled by Sunrise Rotarians recognising the club's early association. They are

Rotarians **John Wood** and **Marie Wood** (above).

**Fundraising** is increasingly a challenge and highly competitive. All funds raised stay locally to support families from across the region. Operation of RMH relies on fundraising and the generous support of local businesses, organisations and individuals.

**Ronald McDonald House Charities Australia** The licensees of McDonalds restaurants support the Houses by providing the insurance costs. A great initiative is the Ronald McDonald Learning Program,

providing tutoring for children who have missed school through illness, even at the Higher School Certificate level.

Funds raised on McHappy Days and from donation boxes on the counters are sent to RMH Charities Australia.

Deborah is a member of the Mission Leadership Group which meets twice a year to determine what happens.

*Family Room* After years of planning, the Family Room at the hospital opened on 18 December 2017. Staffed by volunteers working four-hour shifts, eight hours per day, seven days a week, the room provides parents and families with a quiet space for respite from bedside vigils. It has comfortable lounges, laundry facilities as well as shower, toilet, microwave and internet access.

Holidays at beach retreats such as Bateman's Bay, Port Douglas and Foster are available to families for a no charge holiday which gives families the opportunity to enjoy their time together following a serious illness with their child.

*Sponsorship* Businesses such as Sealy (beds) Sorbent (toilet paper) and Amart (furniture) assist Ronald McDonald Houses.
